What is ACHIEVE?

ACHIEVE is a community college certificate program for students with intellectual disabilities that includes credit and non-credit classes, intensive advising, involvement in campus life, participation in community based internships, and assistance with job placement.





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Certificate Options

Fast-track to Employment Certificate *Can be completed in one year* Comprehensive Transition Certificate

Can be completed in two years






Why Achieve as District Partnership.

Transition within the IEP

- Considerations:
 - Needs, Strengths, Interests, Preferences
 - NEEDS:
 - Is there an instructional need now to support access to college?



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How

First and foremost from a District perspective Achieve is a contracted partnership. This means:



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- Cost considerations / Contract
- The student's education is the responsibility of the district. The IEP services must be designed and monitored by the district. (Achieve is NOT a K12 certificated provider of special education services.)
 - Case Management & Service Delivery Considerations
 - Point of contact
 - Provision of services
 - Logistics / transportation
 - Cost and efficiency



Outcomes for the Kent School District

Current numbers: 13 New Referrals: 13 Completions to Date: 7

Five out of the seven students are working and/or continuing college study.





The role of ACHIEVE for KSD

Ideally a two-year program Students ready for increased independence Ability to navigate campus Ability to – after training – use Metro, Access or self-transport Students who desire college experience No recent history of unsafe behavior ACHIEVE students as part of our community


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Career Inclusion
